Lions' five global causes

Lions Clubs International (LCI) has five global causes. We aim to have a number of activities this year that involve the community and highlight these global causes.

- **Diabetes** We serve to reduce the prevalence of diabetes and improve quality of life for those diagnosed.
- **Vision** We serve to prevent avoidable blindness and improve quality of life for people who are blind and visually impaired.
- Hunger We serve to ensure all community members have access to nutritious foods.
- **Environment** We serve to sustainably protect and restore our environment to improve the well-being of all communities.
- **Childhood Cancer** Lions and Leos provide support for the needs of children and families affected by childhood cancer through impactful service activities.

The April Cowrie market proceeds will go to the Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation, and we will use the opportunity to highlight childhood cancer as one of Lions' global causes.

Well done to Deb and Allen (Lions) and Will (FoL) who took part in Clean Up Australia Day on 5 March – joined by some scouts and others. Although small in number, this group highlighted our concern for the Environment. Some in the community joined in *because* Lions committed to the event. That's also leadership.

- Support for Feed Me Surf Coast which rescues food from landfill, and feeds those who need a hand
- Environmental activities including an annual beach clean-up on New Year's Day
- Support for various Community events volunteers (such as the Cadel Evans Road Race)
- Sponsorship of camps for local children (Lions Wilderness Village, Licola)
- Social activities including monthly dinner meetings (we are a members' Club!)
- Occasional working bees for those needing a helping hand
- Recycling of used spectacles
- 'One-offs' to support communities (e.g. tools to Mallacoota after the fires)
- Looking out for retired and infirm Lions and partners



Born in London, Brian survived the worst of the bombing of London in 1940 when he was only 5 years old. His family often slept in their neighbour's air raid shelter, which was a frightening (and cramped) situation. During all of this madness, he had his toy Teddy Bear for comfort. He was then sent north, away from the bombs . . . but also from his parents. Three years after the war, he and his family emigrated to Australia. His memories of the war years have stayed with him, as has his Teddy Bear. Brian was President of the Lions Club of Torquay and has given 25 years of service to our community.

Relay raises \$16,000 at cancer fundraiser

FOUR Surf Coast Secondary College students have led the charge in raising more than \$16,000 for the Cancer Council through a community Relay for Life fundraiser.

Surf Coast Secondary College students Nash Cox, Riley Cotter, Shinay Grobler and Lily Jarman laced up their runners for the weekend's fundraiser, which is back for the first time since the pandemic, to continue helping cancer victims and their families Australia-wide.

The 20 hours of movement kicked off on Friday evening with a special opening ceremony and thank you, which was followed by a cancer survivors lap

before the official marathon begun.

While originally setting out to achieve a goal of \$3,000, the quartet were absolutely shocked to raise five times more than their goal thanks to the support of event sponsors and locals in the community.

"It was definitely a lot of work, but we are very proud of ourselves, considering nt of effort and time we put into the amo it," Year 10 student Nash Cox said.

"We got over five times our original goal and it really showed the community's support of young kids ... it gives us a lot hope of what we can do in the future. "We had around \$8,000 donated from ofh

our sponsors... and amazingly another \$8,500 was from people signing up and connecting with their friends and family." Surf Coast Secondary College principal Erin Wright lauded her students for their

back to the community "These four students are amazing leaders for our future... it really warms my heart that we are in such wonderful hands with the young people we have in

our community." Nash and the Surf Coast Secondary College team expressed that everyone is touched by cancer in many different ways and cited that as a contributing factor to the success of the fundraiser.

"It's definitely something that has touched the four of us... when we brainstormed it ... everyone knew someone that had been diagnosed or affected by cancer.

"It worked out that this cause was something that could benefit the whole community.

The Year 10 students hope to mentor and inspire younger kids to do what they

have done in the future, suggesting it could be something that could be passed down to students.
