- Foster accountability and provide a safe place to be heard and to respond.
- Promote interactions and community connections.





The stones were placed in a circle, with a round stone in the centre; forming the yarning circle. The area was then resurfaced.

Local residents and a couple of Lions spread the mulch over the yarning circle area last Thursday. Then we all sat around the yarning circle for a photo (and a yarn).



When all work is complete, a final smoking ceremony will be held, and it will be officially open. We have been in touch with Energy Australia and have begun the grant acquittal process.



Pub Raffles are full steam ahead and records are waiting to be broken!



## Lions Village 20th Anniversary

A Community Committee was formed perhaps 25 years ago with the aim of establishing a retirement village in Torquay. At that time there wasn't a Retirement Village in Torquay. The Committee raised some funds but decided not to proceed with the project

The Lions Club of Torquay agreed to take up the project and from its members, established a Committee of Management for the project. As the Lions Club was not able to engage in commercial activity, an arms-length organization was formed, Lion Village Torquay Incorporated Association. This was done with the assistance of Roy Morris whose Company has provided legal advice and services to the Village since that time. Joseph Messina is with us today representing Roy.

The funds raised by the Community Committee were transferred to the Lions Village Committee and these were used for up-front costs before we had any income.

The Committee considered several sites for the new Village. The decision was taken to build on the Shire land adjacent to the Elouera Aged Care facility. It was envisaged that this would provide an easier transition for those residents of the Village who reached the stage where additional care was required.

Lions Village did not have the capital to buy the land outright, however, the Shire agreed to sell the land to Lions Village on very favourable terms. No up-front payment was required. The Shire agreed that Lions Village could pay for the land as the Units in each stage were completed and sold. The land was sold to Lions Village on these terms in November 1999.

The Shire provided support for the project by nominating Ken McCallum, a Councillor at the time, to serve on the Village Committee with us.

Lions Village Committee acquired the services of Graham Lyons, an Architect who had experience in developing retirement villages, including the Abervale Village in Grovedale. Graham developed the master plan for the Village of 29 units, all with 2 bedrooms and a garage, and the Village Centre. He prepared the documentation and supervised construction of the whole project. Lions Village Committee was very fortunate to have the service and support of Graham over the whole project.

Lions Village applied to each of the major banks for a loan to construct the Village. All the applications were unsuccessful as Lions Village had no assets to secure the loan. However, the CBA advised us that they would reconsider the application if the Shire agreed to be guarantor for the loan.

After initial discussions with the Shire about whether they would be prepared to guarantee the loan, they sent us to their financial adviser. Following that, we developed a business plan and after a lengthy period of negotiations with the Shire, an agreement was reached. The Shire agreed to guarantee a loan of \$1m to build the first stage of 8 units.

Graham Lyons, the Architect, arranged a contract on our behalf with Hamlan Homes Builders for the first stage. Construction on the site commenced in August 2000.

We were fortunate to acquire the services at this stage of Keith Woodland who was retiring as Sales Manager at Abervale Retirement Village at that time. He offered his time free to help us sell the units in the early stages of the Village and to explain to us what we needed to know about running a retirement village.

We are for ever grateful also, to those people who had enough confidence in us to buy units in the first stage before the Village was established and when the rest of the site was a mud hole. Cec and Margaret Browning were two of those people and they are still living there today. They moved into their unit in March 2001, 20 years ago.

## Lions Village 20th Anniversary

The rest of the Village was built in stages with the last units being completed in July 2003. The Village Centre was completed soon after.

The Lieutenant Governor, Lady Southey, officially opened the Village in January 2004. Also, the Lions Club won the annual State Government award for the best Service Club project for that year.

Finally, a short note about the Lions Ladies. Having been taught the art of silk sceening by Rita Thomas, they designed and made the silk wall hanging proudly displayed on the wall here when the Village was built. The design represents the marine life of the local area of Torquay and was proudly presented to the Lions Village.

So that's the story of how the Lions Village happened 20 years ago.
